This may be a shock to some, but year-long school has many benefits that are being implemented into Erie's schools and all the PA school districts.

Year-long school improves students' academic achievement. Studies show that long summer breaks leave the students confused when returning to school in August. Not only that, the students are out of routine, especially when teachers assign tests and large amounts of homework.

Wolf says, "Year-long school is the best course for action moving forward. It not only improves students' academic status, but it is proven to heighten students test scores, which allows for more room for the budget to be equally spread out."

The National Association for Year-Round Education reported in 2007 that 3,000 yearround schools enrolled more than 2 million students in the United States. The U.K practices and praises year-round schooling: educators praise it as a helpful way to teach students without the detriment of the summer and a great way to keep students in a constant state of learning.

Another benefit of year-round school is that it can replace summer school, which many districts have cancelled due to budget cuts. For students who traditionally attend summer school because they need help in academics, year-round school addresses that need for help throughout the year.

Mr. Vieira, Dean of Collegiate Academy, says, "The district hopes to utilize year-long schooling as a beneficial tool to both educators and students."

All the students worry about where their next meal is going to come from during their school day, but one thing we all must ask ourselves is, do we really want the students to keep eating celery they found in the gym?





COLLEGIATE'S POOL REOPENS AFTER 25 YEARS By Lia Totleben





The pool is named the James Vieira Aquatic Center, after Dean Vieira, who was a swimmer during his high-school career at Strong Vincent.



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


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A comparison of Taco Bell, Chipotle, and Moe's sales estimates throughout 2016. The data was recieved by Taco Bell Inc.
